REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

The officers, as the trustees of the charity, present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2016. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 8 and comply with the charity's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) published on 16 July 2014.

Objectives and activities

The purpose of the charity is to relieve the poverty, sickness and distress, and advance the education of persons resident in the State of Rajasthan, India, by supporting the work of Seva Mandir, a non-profit voluntary organisation registered in India.

The Friends of Seva Mandir furthers its charitable purposes for the public benefit through its remittances to Seva Mandir and from helping to attract other sources of UK funding that are made directly to Seva Mandir. The officers confirm that they have reviewed the Charity's activities and confirm they meet the guidance given by the Charity Commission with regard to public benefit.

Achievements and performance

We are pleased to report that over the last financial year the UK Friends have generated no less than £290,962, details of which are provided in the Financial Review. Your faith in Seva Mandir is a blessing to thousands of needy people in Southern Rajasthan.

Seva Mandir provides support to village families that enable them to have a real say in their own destiny. This temple of service, Seva Mandir, lays the foundations for the establishment of democratic decision making among village people. Pre-natal care, post natal care, nursery schooling, primary schooling and, vocational training set young people up for life.

Seva Mandir helps breathe goodness into the impoverished earth through the building of wells that provide clean water, the building of walls to protect the land, and the excavating of mountain trenches to retain monsoon rain. Seva Mandir's expertise forever blossoms in the arid lands that surround Udaipur.

A constant theme through all that Seva Mandir achieves is the development of women in the community. Be that in village governance, project management and, profoundly, self help groups, the voice of women is vital and life enhancing.

The wonderful group of people who make Seva Mandir what it is are not ones to talk about their achievements. Their humility, empathy, and dedication provide a bedrock to the impoverished communities. The UK Friends are deeply grateful for their fortitude.

The heart of our work in the UK is to spread the good doings of Seva Mandir in a gentle way that naturally leads to engagement and financial support. In February 2016 the Friends of Seva Mandir hosted a symposium at Guy's Hospital attended by over 150 guests. We were privileged to hear from the Right Honourable Sajid Javid, Secretary of State for Business, Innovation and Skills, Baroness Shirley Williams, and new Patron Celia Imrie who had been filmed in Los Angeles talking about her experiences in Udaipur filming the Best Exotic Marigold Hotel movies.

The insights of the speakers gave great heart to the work of Seva Mandir and its role of helping the needy in modern India.

In June 2015, we were pleased to host Sir Mark Tully who gave a penetrating assessment of the impact of the new Government. From his home in Delhi, Mark's ability to observe India over a generation is truly unique.

We announced in last year's report that we wished to develop a voice in foundations and I am pleased to report that we have received a higher level of funding, including donations from The President's Club Charitable Trust, Zurich Community Trust, Saga Charitable Trust, and St James's Place Foundation. So far in 2016/17 we have seen further grants from Thomas Cook Children's Charity and British & Foreign School Society.

Seva Mandir Chief Executive Priyanka Singh visited the UK last September. Her presence was, as ever, uniquely valuable in hearing directly about Seva Mandir's vision. India may be rapidly changing, but the rhythm of Rajasthan and those desert villages remains largely untouched. Getting up in the morning, fetching water to drink, wood to burn, and fodder for the wild stock is much as it has been since the beginning of human life. Under Seva Mandir's leadership with the support of the UK Friends, these village people can begin to see a future, a better future, that is of their choosing.

It is heartening to know that the Seva Mandir team take great inspiration from the support of the Friends, thousands of miles away in the UK. You, our Friends, are that inspiration. May that long continue.

Financial Review

Review of financial position

In the financial year ending 31 March 2016 the Friends of Seva Mandir received donations of £142,073.

In addition, Seva Mandir in India received a further £148,889 as a direct result of the efforts of the Friends of Seva Mandir. These additional amounts do not pass through, and are not controlled by, the Friends of Seva Mandir and consequently do not get recorded in the financial statements of The Friends of Seva Mandir.

Overall donations from the UK totalled £290,962 (2014/15: £282,805).

Events during the year were sponsored in full and have been included in the financial statements shown equally both in income, as a gift in kind, and expenditure, as a cost of raising funds. Other costs were just £444, representing the cost of insurance and bank charges. Officers and our administrator provide services on a voluntary basis and did not reclaim any expenses.

Reserve Policy

We aim to ensure income received is forwarded to Seva Mandir within a reasonable period from receipt, usually monthly. A base level of cash reserves of £5,000 is maintained for unforeseen operational costs and to assist funding for future events. Remittance to Seva Mandir of amounts above the base level are made monthly subject to cash reserves exceeding the base level by more than £3,000.

Reserves in excess of this level may be held at specific times for a particular purpose if agreed by the officers. There has been no such requirement to hold cash reserves in excess of this level during the year.

Restricted funds are remitted to Seva Mandir for the specific purpose for which they were given.

Reserves at the end of the year totalled £13,123 and a payment was made to Seva Mandir in mid-April 2016 to reduce to the base level in line with the policy.

Structure, governance and management

The Friends of Seva Mandir is an unincorporated association registered with the Charity Commission (number 328428). The charity is governed by its constitution of 25 March 2012 as updated on 10 September 2014.

The power of appointing new or additional officers is vested in the majority of the officers. Investment decisions are at the discretion of the officers.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the year ended 31 March 2016

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

In preparing the financial statements the Charity follows best practice in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, as amended on 2 February 2016, the Financial Reporting Standard (FRS102), the charity's governing document, and the Charities Act 2011.

The Charity comprises a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102 and the trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the ability to continue as a going concern.

In preparing the accounts, the officers have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS102 and the Charities SORP FRS102 a restatement of comparatives was needed. The transition date was 1 April 2014 and no restatements were required.

INCOME RECOGNITION

Donations, grants and other income are recognised once there is evidence of entitlement, receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably. Gifts in kind and donated services are recognised when received, providing the value of the gift or service can be measured reliably. Value is based on the amount that would be payable in the open market for an alternative item or service. Investment income is recognised when its receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

EXPENDITURE RECOGNITION

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended from which it was incurred.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly whilst others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

COST OF RAISING FUNDS

Cost of raising funds comprises those costs directly attributable to the Charity's fund raising activities.

GRANTS PAYABLE

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is conveyed.

ALLOCATION OF SUPPORT COSTS AND GOVERNANCE COSTS

The cost of support functions and governance is allocated to the Charity's sole activity.

FUNDS

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds. Restricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable for which the donor has specified a purpose.

RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The officers all give freely their time and expertise without any form of remuneration or other benefit in cash or kind (2015: £nil). There are no related party transactions in the year (2015: none).

During the year, an amount of £16,000 was received specifically to build a sports ground at the Seva Mandir residential school, £15,000 for support of residential learning camps for 100 children, £9,526 for the Empowering Youth for a More Just Society project, and £8,835 for sanitation provision across 20 villages.

All restricted amounts were remitted to Seva Mandir during the year to be used specifically for the purpose for which they were given.
