REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The officers, as the trustees of the charity, present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2017. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 8 and comply with the charity's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) published on 16 July 2014.

Objectives and activities

The purpose of the charity is to relieve the poverty, sickness and distress, and advance the education of persons resident in the State of Rajasthan, India, by supporting the work of Seva Mandir, a non-profit voluntary organisation registered in India.

The Friends of Seva Mandir furthers its charitable purposes for the public benefit through its remittances to Seva Mandir and from helping to attract other sources of UK funding that are made directly to Seva Mandir. The officers confirm that they have reviewed the Charity's activities and confirm they meet the guidance given by the Charity Commission with regard to public benefit.

The Countess Mountbatten of Burma

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Patricia Mountbatten in June 2017. Lady Mountbatten has served as the Patron of the Friends of Seva Mandir for many years and her counsel and support have been a great strength and example to the Friends. Her legacy is assured and her words taken from a letter she wrote to us in 2015 are a blessing:

I have been associated with Seva Mandir for more years than I can remember. It is quite the most beguiling organisation, truly helping impoverished village people in the deserts of Rajasthan to articulate their own unique needs; and then assist those very same people to secure for themselves sustainable improvements to their lives.

There are few things more joyful than to see young children learning. Learning Hindi, learning to read and write Hindi, and learning how to do their times tables provides kids a foundation for life. Girls and boys alike receive an equal opportunity education, encouraged by parents, and provided by teachers who turn up for the job, and who love to teach. Seva Mandir sees to all that.

Patricia Mountbatten will be missed.

Achievements and performance

Since we wrote a year ago, the United Kingdom has voted to leave the European Union and the United States have voted for a new President. Both votes reflect an electorate that in part did not feel that their needs were being heard.

Not so in Southern Rajasthan. Seva Mandir's raison d'être is to seek out the impoverished village peoples and develop their democratic voice. Then, profoundly, to listen to those voices and respond positively and sustainably.

Villages are transformed into communities. Communities that take responsibility for education, healthcare, land development and women's rights. Seeing is believing. Seeing how a wall built around a well protects women from slipping in the dark when fetching water, and drowning. Seeing a sports ground built in the residential school that develops the confidence of the most needy kids of all. See them play. See them succeed.

It has been said so often before but it does not become less true from repetition: Seva Mandir makes a sustainable difference to thousands and thousands of people. The Friends of Seva Mandir are privileged to do what we can to help, and we are deeply grateful to donors for their generosity.

In this regard, we are pleased to report that over the last financial year the UK Friends have generated no less than £220,286. Thank you! Further details are provided in the Financial Review.

Our work with foundations has continued to be successful and we acknowledge the wonderful support of Thomas Cook, British & Foreign School Society, Waterloo, Saga, The Presidents Club, The John Younger Trust, and Lord Deedes Charitable Trust.

We were pleased to host the following events for donors over the last year:

In May 2016, Sunil Khilnani, celebrated author of Incarnations.

In June 2016, Sir Mark Tully whose insight into Indian affairs is second to none.

In February 2017, a private screening of *Viceroy's House* at the ICA in London. Acclaimed actor Simon Callow introduced the film to over 150 guests, making for a memorable evening and a very successful fundraiser.

That the extraordinarily gifted Mark, Sunil and Simon should give up their time to the Friends of Seva Mandir says everything that needs to be said about how well Seva Mandir is viewed.

Seva Mandir will soon enter its 50th year. It is a much used phrase to say that we want to make a difference. In Seva Mandir's case, they have truly made a difference, touching the lives of 360,000 people. Golden anniversaries are inevitably a time for reflection. It is not in the nature of Seva Mandir to celebrate, but we the Friends can celebrate the fact that Seva Mandir exists at all with its wonderful people who do so many unique things to improve the lives of others.

Financial Review

Review of financial position

In the financial year ending 31 March 2017 the Friends of Seva Mandir received donations totalling £138,174 (2015/16: £142,073).

In addition, Seva Mandir in India received a further £82,112 as a direct result of the efforts of the Friends of Seva Mandir. These additional amounts do not pass through, and are not controlled by, the Friends of Seva Mandir and consequently do not get recorded in the financial statements of The Friends of Seva Mandir.

Overall donations from the UK totalled £220,286, beating our target of £210,000.

Events during the year were sponsored in full and the costs have been included in the financial statements shown equally both in income, as a gift in kind, and expenditure, as a cost of raising funds. Other costs were just £587, representing the cost of insurance and bank charges. Officers and our administrator provide services on a voluntary basis and did not reclaim any expenses.

Reserves Policy

We aim to ensure income received is forwarded to Seva Mandir within a reasonable period from receipt, usually monthly. A base level of cash reserves of £5,000 is maintained for unforeseen operational costs and to assist funding for future events. Remittance to Seva Mandir of amounts above the base level are made monthly subject to cash reserves exceeding the base level by more than £3,000.

Reserves in excess of this level may be held at specific times for a particular purpose if agreed by the officers. There has been no such requirement to hold cash reserves in excess of this level during the year.

Restricted funds are remitted to Seva Mandir for the specific purpose for which they were given.

Reserves at the end of the year totalled £8,712 (2016: £13,123).

Structure, governance and management

The Friends of Seva Mandir is an unincorporated association registered with the Charity Commission (number 328428). The charity is governed by its constitution of 25 March 2012 as updated on 10 September 2014.

The power of appointing new or additional officers is vested in the majority of the officers. Investment decisions are at the discretion of the officers.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the year ended 31 March 2017

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

In preparing the financial statements the Charity follows best practice in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP): Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, as amended on 2 February 2016, the Financial Reporting Standard (FRS102), the charity's governing document, and the Charities Act 2011.

The Charity has taken advantage of the provisions available to smaller entities as proscribed in the update to the SORP published in February 2016, including the ability to dispense with the presentation of a cash flow statement.

The Charity comprises a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102 and the trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the ability to continue as a going concern.

INCOME RECOGNITION

Donations, grants and other income are recognised once there is evidence of entitlement, receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably. Gifts in kind and donated services are recognised when received, providing the value of the gift or service can be measured reliably. Value is based on the amount that would be payable in the open market for an alternative item or service. Investment income is recognised when its receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

EXPENDITURE RECOGNITION

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended from which it was incurred.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly whilst others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

COST OF RAISING FUNDS

Cost of raising funds comprises those costs directly attributable to the Charity's fund raising activities.

GRANTS PAYABLE

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is conveyed.

ALLOCATION OF SUPPORT COSTS AND GOVERNANCE COSTS

The cost of support functions and governance is allocated to the Charity's sole activity.

FUNDS

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds. Restricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable for which the donor has specified a purpose.

RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The officers all give freely their time and expertise without any form of remuneration or other benefit in cash or kind (2016: £nil). Unconditional donations from officers totalled £35,400 (2016: £22,900). There are no other related party transactions in the year (2016: none).
